The Freemason Letters (Probably Fiction)

Back in 1995, when President Clinton was in office, a strange discovery was made during the renovation of the Lincoln Bedroom in the White House. All of the furniture and artwork in the room was carefully assessed and catalogued as part of this renovation process, and while many of the items in the room were found to be associated with the time of Lincoln's presidency - the mantel was not of the same period. The decision was made to replace it with a better-suited neo-classical one of 19th century design. When pulled from the wall, a peculiar iron-lined hole, 1 foot in width, was discovered in the portion of the wall the mantel had formerly covered.
